

- Traditional Swedish Schools teaches complimentary Swedish
- Original course plan also for SMUL
- Requirement of speaking Swedish at home
- No frame work for children without previous knowledge
- Separate track for Beginner Swedish was started in the summer of 2020.



Content for the first four years of language study

Advice about using Swedish at home

- Approach Swedish in a playful way
- Set realistic goals
- Discuss why you want your child to learn Swedish. Listen to their feelings about learning Swedish
- Avoid negative terms such as laziness when the child is struggling with motivation
- Prasie effort and be careful to correct pronounciation
- Set goals together and celebrate success (phone call to grandmom in Swedish, a text to cousins in Swedish)
- Increase the use of Swedish at home:
 - Repeat in Swedish after your say something in English
 - When you child has increased the vocabulary, say something in Swedish before you repeat in English
 - Use post-its on items around the house
 - Situational Swedish Fika, movie time, daily session in Pratstart
